The number of enrollments or high school graduates determines the width of the reported percentage intervals. The greater the uncertainty in the calculated percentage, the greater the width. For example, high schools reporting 10-20 graduates in a given year have percentages reported in interval widths of 20%; high schools reporting 41-100 graduates in a given year have interval widths of 5%. Blank cells indicate no high school graduates enrolled in the college.
